### **Union Baptist Church Missionary Weekend**

The event involved all organizations within the church. The weekend was coordinated by Minister Cecil Fields. The event was an outgrowth of his efforts towards serving and evangelizing the community by the Soul Patrol of Union Baptist Church. The outreach effort attained its goal of having those participating working as "One body on One day" in our community.

The outlets for service were as diversified as the organizations giving Christian Service.

else hope and courage to not give up.


You may have had the faith to pray your way out, which will teach someone else to pray-to have faith. This is what God tells us to do. To help somebody show from day to day.

The day was a beautiful testimony to God's people's willingness to give of themselves.

The day began with a meal in the Fellowship Hall of Union Baptist. This was followed by a workshop on Mission, with guest speaker Dr. Brenda Harewood. She gave everyone the benefit of her years of experience on the missionary field all over the world. She has a heart and spirit dedicated to mission. She reminded the listeners that the programs and collections that are generally thought of as mission are not an end in themselves. She reminded us all of the actual giving of personal time and sacrificial giving that was exhibited by Jesus. We all were challenged to reexamine our own commitments to mission work and very personal nature of the connections we make in outreach ministry aimed at spreading the Gospel message through direct service. Our showing up, spending time, and helping in whatever capacity might have more impact for Christ than any sermon from a distant pulpit.

It is noteworthy that on the day of the Mission Weekend, hurricane Irene was hitting the city. Although there was the potential of heavy rain and high winds, over a hundred people braved the elements in efforts to give service for Christ to the community. Attendees from Mt. Gilead and other local churches took part in this Mission In Action event. Events scheduled for the day included the following: Carolina House - helping to set up the African American Variety Show, greeting attendees, etc.; Habitat For

Humanity - Helping with landscaping, weeding, etc.; Inter-Faith Food Shuttle - picking and packing produce, organizing and bagging food, and labeling; Ronald McDonald House - Cleaning public areas, making baked goods, providing or serving meals; Nursing Homes - visiting people on the sick and shut in list, leading devotion or worship services, and giving words of encouragement and prayers.

The Senior Missionary Department of Union Baptist under the Leadership of Mrs. Caroline Leathers and Georgetta Parker worked to coordinate the various groups that participated in the days events. It was the first time an undertaking of this magnitude had been attempted. It was a learning process for all involved as well as a blessing for not only those served, but also those who did service as well. I believe that God was truly glorified. There was excitement and expectancy in the air as all groups went out to give service. From the conversations upon return to the church, each group seemed to have experienced the work of the Holy Spirit as He blessed their efforts in whatever form of service that was rendered. The prayer is that this is only the beginning of this type of Mission In Action outreach. If we take this year's lessons learned and apply them, we will be even more effective at next year's Mission Weekend at Union Baptist. Let us continue to pray for God's blessings on this great work for the kingdom.
